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Winter's Snow Crab Season Opens

The Long-Awaited First Auction Livens Up Taiza Fishing Harbor November 6, Tango

The snow crab fishing season opened on November 6th, and the first auction was held in Taiza fishing harbor. The total catch of the first day was 676.7 kilos of male crabs, and 2685 kilos of female crabs, which is slightly below that of an average year.

When the auction began, the wholesalers judged the crabs with skilled eyes and their lively voices rang out in the fishing harbor.

After the auction for the female crabs, called Koppe crabs, the auction for the male crabs, or Taiza crabs, began. As Kyotango's high-grade brand of foodstuffs, the popular Taiza crabs are given as gifts that non-locals receive if they choose to pay Kyotango's local "furusato nouzei" tax. Five Taiza crabs can sell for as much as 1.11 million yen.

One business person said "There are plenty of types of high quality crabs being caught, so Taiza Fishing Harbor is a very good port. Its forte is providing customers with freshly caught goods. After pricing it for the first time this year today, we hope that the seafood will popular this season."

In Kyoto, the season for catching male crabs is until March 20th, and for female crabs, just until the end of the year.

This was the last time the competition will be held, and committee Chairman Masao Yamazaki said "We are full of gratitude to have been supported by so many citizens, groups, and businesses." At the finish line, local mascots cheered, and the Mineyama Junior High School concert band performed for the finishing teams.

At the end of the exchange, the students asked "What is the appeal of Tango chirimen?" and the pair answered "There are so many that we can't say them all, but it's wonderful that its long history has fostered a lot of art.
