On the 20<sup>th</sup> of August, 12 video production students from Hagoromo University of International Studies (Sakai City, Osaka Prefecture) held a four-day film training camp at Okuono Community Center. A modern society professor at Hagoromo University, Kiyomi Murakami, met Okuono ward mayor, Katsuhiko Kawaguchi, while looking for a suitable training camp location. Ward mayor Kawaguchi invited them to utilize Okuono, and started this annual tradition 5 years ago. University students lodge in the area at this time of year, working on various film projects.

The focus of this year's camp is to have the students polish their skills by creating a PR video of the region. Everything from shooting to editing will be performed solely by the students. They captured the nature of Kyotango City by drone, including the sights of Omiya's satoyama and the coast of Tango. A first time attendee of the training camp shared the following, "Green trees, terraced rice-fields, and ocean views... these are sights that you just can't see in the city. I was pleasantly surprised by the beauty of it all."

Professor Murakami commented, "In the past we have done projects including a commercial for Omiya Elementary School, and a project titled  $\lceil$ Foreigners Explore Kyotango $\rfloor$ . It isn't possible to fly drones in most areas of larger cities; Okuono is very useful to the students as they work on their craft. This type of area is extremely rare so

I would love to have next year's training camp take place here as well."
