**Opening Ceremony of the National Road 178 "Juraku Bypass"** 

The Juraku region of Kumihama-cho has be equipped with a new roadway, National Road 178 "The Juraku Bypass". The 260-meter-long and 8-meter-wide road was opened for the first time on June 9<sup>th</sup>.

The previous road bordered Kumihama Bay, but was thin and had poor vision due to curves. This new road has been in the making since 2012, and Diet members, the director of the Tango Koiki Shinko Kyoku (Tango Promotion Office), prefecture council members, Mayor Misaki, city council members, land providers, etc. attended its opening ceremony. After the ceremonial ribbon-cutting, local residents did the honors of taking the first trip down the road. Ward mayor of Juraku, Shingo Izumi, shared a few words: "This improves traffic safety, which is great. Please enjoy the view of Kumihama bay and Mt. Kabuto."

**Preschoolers Help Release Baby Sweetfish** 

Baby sweetfish were introduced to all areas of the Noma River on April 22<sup>nd</sup>.

The Noma Fisheries Cooperative and the United Noma-ku conduct this effort every year in anticipation of the sweetfish fishing season. This year, 32,000 sweetfish will be released by the start of June, and on this day, the children released approximately 20,000 of them at 16 different locations.

27 preschoolers from Yasaka Kodomoen participated in the release of sweetfish at Nonaka-ku's flood plains after learning about them. They were told that the released fish, who were around 10 centimeters in length, will eat moss off of the rocks in the river, which is an ideal environment for them to grow large due to clean water and plentiful food. The children said things like, "take care now" and "grow big" to the fish as they carefully dumped the sweetfish-filled buckets into the river. **Diving Beatle Rice Now Grown Pesticide-Free** 

Ryukoku University Students visited the areas of Mie and Morimoto on June 1<sup>st</sup> and started annual activities for the 5<sup>th</sup> time. This year, they received help from Kyotango Morimoto Agriculture and planted 100% pesticide-free seedlings. There were many first-time planters amongst the students, but they planted the seedlings precisely as instructed, even while having their feet sucked down into the mud.

Prof. Kinkoujitsu, the supervisor of the students, talked with us about his desires for the program: "The beautiful views and delicious food of Kyotango are extremely valuable and capturing. We hope to highlight 'Diving Beatle Rice' further by farming rice together with the locals of this region."

#### Diving Beatle Rice (Gengorou-kyou no Kome):

Rice farmed in the rice fields near the Omiya Interchange, which is where endangered Diving Beatles have been found. Efforts to turn this into a well-known brand are currently being made with a focus on student-led sales.
